Emergency Management

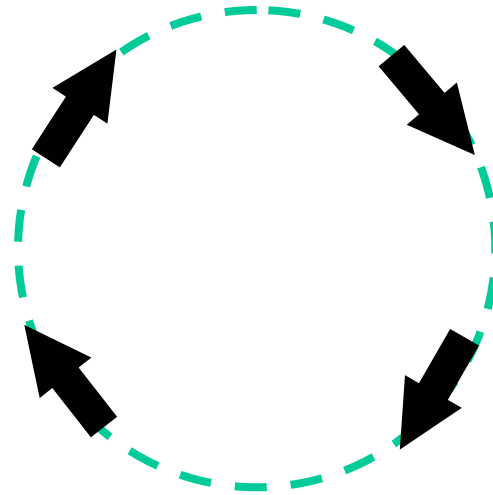
Oregon Emergency Management will continue to work with cities and counties to prepare for all hazards- terrorism is just one of many!

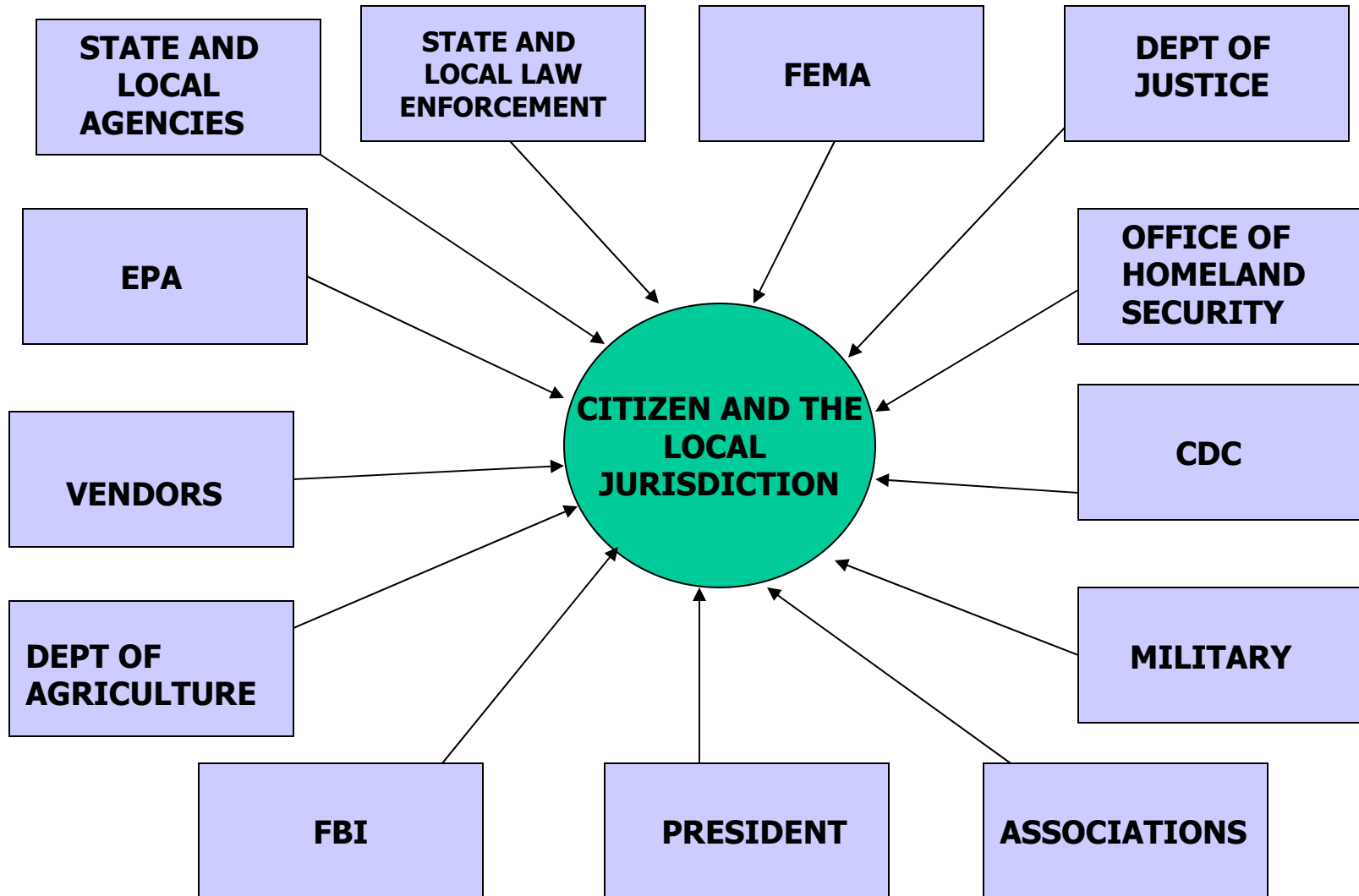

FUNDING

DOJ Grant - \$3 Million distributed-\$4.6 million more to distribute for equipment, training, exercising-first responders

FEMA Grant - \$1.6 million to distribute for all hazards planning and citizens corps – (FY02 money)

CDC Grant - \$14 million has been distributed for health and hospital preparedness and planning

EPA Grant - \$700,000 for water system security

FY03 Money ????? \$37 Billion
